Welcome. The Marriage Tribunal's role is to process annulment applications. These are internal procedures of the Catholic Church and have no standing in civil law in the United Kingdom. The granting of a declaration of nullity allows a divorced Catholic to re-marry in the Catholic Church, or for a Catholic to marry a divorced non-Catholic. In some circumstances, it allows for someone to seek reception into the Catholic Church.

The Interdiocesan Tribunal of Sydney—Diocese of Wollongong (also known as the “Marriage Tribunal”) is a service of the diocese to assist with the pastoral care of divorced and remarried persons seeking to have their marriage recognised in the Church, divorced persons seeking to remarry, and divorced persons seeking clarification of their standing in the Church.
